Essential elements of spoken language, concepts and principles of phonetics, use of International Phonetic Association (IPA) system of phonetic transcription and practice in speech sound production and identification, analysis of problems of pronunciation

- 3. To become aware of the need for distinct articulation

Plan: Define the current problem, process, and issue and establish objectives and processes required to deliver the desired results.

Do: Implement the plans and new processes developed.

Check: Monitor and evaluate the implemented process by testing the results against the predetermined objectives.

Act: Apply actions necessary for improvement if the results require changes.




Figure 1: PDCA Cycle (http://www.swopehealth.org)
