Course Description:

Japanese scripts - Hiragana and Katakana, 50 basic kanji, greetings, and basic sentence patterns used in daily Japanese conversation.

Objectives of the Course:

This course aims:

1. To emphasize on reading and writing Japanese scripts – Hiragana, Katakana and basic Kanji
2. To acquire some basic vocabulary and expressions in daily conversation

Course Learning Outcomes:

1. Memorize Japanese alphabets.
2. Use appropriate greetings expression in daily conversation.
3. Develop the basic skills in reading, writing, listening, and speaking of basic Japanese.

Teaching-learning activities:

1. Lecture
2. Writing practices
3. Dictations
4. Small tests
5. Reading tests

Course requirements:

1. A minimum of 80% attendance is required to sit for the midterm examination and the final examination.
2. There will be 5 dictations, 3 small tests, 2 reading tests and several writing practices.

The Plan-Do-Check-Act Cycle (PDCA) provides an easy but effective approach for problem solving and managing change, ensuring that ideas are appropriately tested before the full implementation. It can be used in all sorts of situations and can be clarified as follows:

Plan: Define the current problem, process, and issue and establish objectives and processes required to deliver the desired results.

Do: Implement the plans and new processes developed.

Check: Monitor and evaluate the implemented process by testing the results against the predetermined objectives.

Act: Apply actions necessary for improvement if the results require changes.

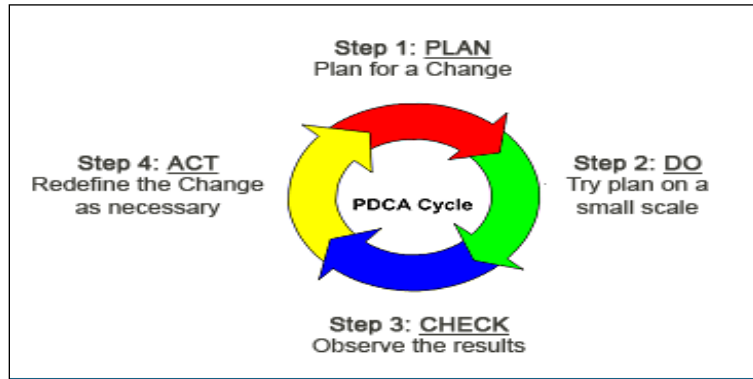


Figure 1: PDCA Cycle (<http://www.swopehealth.org>)
