Integrated English skills essential for both academic and entrepreneurial competencies: project proposal and report writing, seminar presentation, and intercultural communication

This course aims to enable students to use English to:

1. Listen to English texts for gist, details, and inferences.
2. Participate effectively and confidently in intercultural setting.
3. Read university-level texts.
4. Develop higher-order skills such as critical thinking needed in the academic and business setting.
5. Write various academic and business type texts.
6. Give effective presentations.

**Course Learning Outcomes:**

1. To explain the gist, details and inferences of various listening texts in an academic setting.
2. To express their opinions fluently and confidently in intercultural settings.
3. To use reading strategies for comprehension, inferences, and interpretations of university-level texts.
4. To compare and contrast different viewpoints presented in various academic and business texts.
5. To write various academic and business type essays with accurate grammatical structures.
6. To give academic and business presentations.

**Quality Assurance Process**

The Plan-Do-Check-Act Cycle (PDCA) provides an easy but effective approach for problem solving and managing change, ensuring that ideas are appropriately tested before the full implementation. It can be used in all sorts of situations and can be clarified as follows:

**Plan:** Define the current problem, process, and issue and establish objectives and processes required to deliver the desired results.

**Do:** Implement the plans and new processes developed.

**Check:** Monitor and evaluate the implemented process by testing the results against the predetermined objectives.

**Act:** Apply actions necessary for improvement if the results require changes.

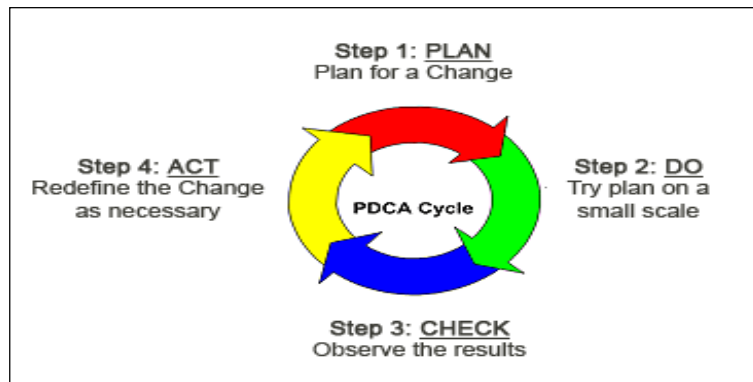


Figure 1: PDCA Cycle (<http://www.swopehealth.org>)
